Criminal Justice - Corrections



Corrections public service professionals are valuable members of public safety and management teams in society. Federal, state, local and private corrections systems rely on these professionals to perform duties in institutional and community settings. These duties may include custody and control, assisting in treatment and prevention programs, juvenile delinquency, interviews, and interrogations.

Career Opportunities

Probation and correctional treatment specialist positions are available at the federal, state and local government levels, and also at private institutions. Employment of probation officers and correctional treatment specialists is projected to grow four percent from 2014 to 2024, slower than the average for all occupations. Limited state and local government funding for corrections will temper employment growth. However, job openings should be plentiful because many people leave the occupation each year. The median annual wage for probation officers and correctional treatment specialists was \$49,060 in May 2014 (Occupational Outlook Handbook).

Lakeland's Program

The corrections associate degree program is designed to prepare students with the knowledge, skills, and abilities necessary to pursue careers in criminal justice, and/or transition to bachelor degree programs. Positions are available in federal, state, local, and private institutions as well as in community-based programs. Employment activities range from custody and control to responsibility for assisting in treatment and prevention programs.

The program is also intended to support the continued professional growth of in-service correctional practitioners through the enhancement of general skills, knowledge and abilities related to the correctional field. Credit may be granted for in-service practitioners who present proof of having completed advanced corrections-related training, educational programs and/or the Ohio Basic Police Academy and/or the Ohio Corrections Academy. Students seeking credit for experience should contact a criminal justice specialist in the Counseling Center.

Lakeland graduates can transfer to a four-year college program at either the Holden University Center, or other colleges throughout Ohio. Students should meet with a criminal justice specialist in the Counseling Center to facilitate the process.
